PRESIDENT'S COLUMN...... 1985, the Year of Animation, passed through Chicago with a whimper instead of a bang. Despite our high hopes for the TRICKFILM Festival at the Art Institute, it turned out to be a frustrating experience for We concentrated all of our efforts towards the festival, suspending our usual programming. Our function was to help the Film Center in planning the programs, assist in promoting the screenings, and help with writing the program notes. In return, the Film Center was to promote ASIFA and the Year of Animation as an integral part of the festival. I am proud to report that we held up our end of the bargain, and am sad to report that Film Center did not. What we did experience was an almost total lack of cooperation and communication. that has left us skeptical about any future ventures with the Film Center. To make matters worse, the Film Center did an inadequate job of promoting the festival: the result was painfully small audience turnouts for the screenings. That is the most tragic part of this story. Many Chicagoans and animation enthusiasts missed a unique opportunity to see some quality animation. Those of us who did attend the screenings can share the frustration over the lost opportunity to bring animation to a wider audience.

For the last two years ASIFA Central has been pretty much of a one man show. I have served as program director, newsletter editor, publicity director, and so on. The result is that I am slowly, but surely, burning out. To prevent from being turned into a crispy critter I am relinquishing all of those jobs, save the Presidency. This is the last newsletter I will publish; and it may be the last one period unless we have volunteers to help share the burden. So my fellow members, its up to you to make this a real volunteer organization. The job openings are lisited in this newsletter, so get with it!

On the positive side, its a new year and we are gearing up for some great programs. The months since TRICKFILM have not been idle ones. We have lined up the ASIFA San Francisco reel (actualy on videtape) for a screening in late April at Columbia College, the Tourneee of Animation at the M&R Theatres in May, and the ASIFA East reel for two showings in June at Chicago Filmmakers. There will also be a spectacular members-only picnic this summer (with a swimming pool!). The Board of Directors will meet soon to discuss future programs, and your suggestions and comments are always welcome.

I would again like to stress the importance of member participation in the organization and its programs. ASIFA Central is a volunteer organization, and needs the help of its members if it is to continue as a effective organization. See you at the next program.

Studio Profile (This is the first in a series of profiles on local animation studios and animators.)


Goodrich * Animation is a small, energetic studio that is adjusting to the changes sweeping the animation industry in Chicago. Those changes can be summed up in one word: video. Most of the special effects, or "razzle dazzle", that was previously produced by artists on film, has moved to video. The major production and post-production houses have aquired expensive computer graphics systems that now do this work. Diane Kenna, owner of Goodrich, has had to look to other areas for business, "It is difficult to underbid the bigger houses on this type of work, and that means I have had to be open to other options." These options include trailers for movie theatres, such as the "Season's Greetings" trailer that was screened in local theatres during the Christmas holidays. "It was a great project, and a lot of fun to do. Its not very often you get work where you have creative control; and it was chartacter animation, something that we specialize in", noted Diane. The studio is currently working on another trailer for the same client. This work has supplemented the studio's base of commercials for the broadcast telelvision market.


Diane sees character animation as the focus for her studio, "We can provide middle-market clients with a service that fits within their budget. We were slow to move from industrial-type films to broadcast, and I decided to specialize in character animation. I feel that it makes us unique. We have done computer work and I won't turn it down, but we really enjoy doing character animation. I have a close-knit team of people who work well together, and that atmosphere is important to the quality of work we turn out." Currently on staff are animators Mike Nickelson, Ken Lockwood, and Production Manager Rick Pukis.

Another area Goodrich*Animation has moved into is the "Kid-Vid" market, including work in the home video market for Golden Books Encyclopedias. Diane is enthusiastic about the prospects, "I have always wanted to do children's animation, and that market is opening up in both broadcast television and home video. I see it as a good opportunity to expand our work in character animation." The staff is excited about this new work on the horizon, including a possible cartoon series for television. "We were contacted by a local producer who had an idea for a cartoon series called "Wiremen". He had been to Hanna Barbera and other major studios who wanted to see more development before they would commit themselves to anything", Diane said. Goodrich has completed character development from the producers thumbnail sketches of the tiny magical creatures. "We are putting together a three minute sample to help sell the project, and will act as creative supervisors for the series. "Wiremen" is the kind of work I would like to concentrate on. Fun projects like this keep the creative juices flowing. We will continue to do the bread-and-butter broadcast commercial work, but I also see us moving more in the direction of children's video and specials."

7th WORLD FESTIVAL OF ANIMATED FILMS TO BE HELD IN ZAGREB, YUGOSLAVIA, JUNE 23rd-27th 1986

One of the major animation events of 1986 will be the Festival in Zagreb. This is an ASIFA sponsored event, which is competitive, and gives major prizes that are highly valued. Films are selected by an international selection commission, and judged by a prestigious international jury. Please read the entry forms for further details about eligibility. Films that were entered in last year's ANNECY Festival may be entered this year in Zagreb (since there were no American prize winners in

SPECIAL INFORMATION FOR U.S. ENTRIES READ CAREFULLY

For the 6th time we will be serving the Festival by collecting the American entries and making one group shipment, which is promised to arrive before the deadline. There will be no increase in fee for this service this year. Since the films must be sent to Zagreb in mid-March please act quickly, as follows:

Complete the enclosed entry form in triplicate. If you are entering more films, you can xerox this form. Send two copies directly to Zagreb by airmail. Return the third copy with the film as indicated below.

2. Send your film(s) with the triplicate copy of the entry form to International Film Programs at the East Brunswick address indicated above via UPS OR PRIORITY MAIL INSURED. If you want specific confirmation of arrival, enclose a stamped, self-addressed post card.

3. Make a check or money order payable to INTERNATIONAL FILM PROGRAMS as follows:


16mm ENTRIES from one source - \$20.00 for the first film, \$10.00 for additional films.

There is no entry fee for the Zagreb Festival. This handling fee covers shipping costs to the Festival and back, customs clearance, and return of the film to you by insured method. Films sent directly to Zagreb by individual would cost more, especially with return customs fees. Zagreb will notify successful entrants that their films have been selected by late April. All films will be returned in late July after the Festival.

• SINKING CREEK FILM CELEBRATION, June 10-5, Nashville. Since 1970 this event, held at Vanderbilt University, has provided an intensive lab atmosphere in which filmmakers & students gather to celebrate documentary, dramatic, experimental & animated independent filmmaking. Mary Jane Coleman, the festival's founder & director, guides the program with a vision & enthusiasm that has sustained and expanded the event each year. One main feature is the \$7,000 in cash & equipment awards for the categories of young filmmaker, student & independent. Two years ago the competition expanded from a 30-min. to a 60-min. max. running time & in 1986 the competition will, for the first time, invite feature films (over 60 min.) According to Coleman, this signals Sinking Creek's intention to "recognize the major growth in independent features & allow for that in the competition and in the workshops." The workshop component accounts for much of the activity at Sinking Creek. Again, these technical and professional forums will be geared towards larger formats and budgets in addition to the traditional beginning workshops that, says Coleman, "will hopefully be helpful to all filmmakers." The event also highlights the work of an individual filmmaker, with that filmmaker present. Last year, Jackie Raynal, David Williams & Cecile Starr of the Women's Independent Film Exchange were featured. Judges were Kelly Coleson from the Hirshorn Museum, Ron Green, chair, Ohio State Film/Video dept. & noted filmmaker & photographer Willard Van Dyke. Entry fee: \$8-\$30. Deadline: April-May 2. 
ANIMAFILM Changes

This direction has been decided by international president Raoul Servais in the light of the heavy expenses attached to the publication of such journals today. The less ambitious bulletins will lack the gloss of the earlier issues but will hopefully contain just as much important and interesting information.

ASIFA International voted last year to create a special award and offer it to an outstanding animation artist at festivals that the organization sanctions. The first such prize went to Japanese artist Kihachiro Kawamoto for his magnificent contribution to the world of animation. 




